

Other venues for artwork viewing and sales continue to be at Huggins Hospital, Meredith Village Savings Bank, the Wolfeboro Public Library, and a special TAG (The Artists Group) exhibit during the month of June at the Libby Museum. Watch, too, for details about a special reception at Azure Rising Gallery at which participants will show what they created during the Priscilla Hodges Workshop.

We wish you all an enjoyable summer and hope to see you at our events. Remember, by renewing your membership you are helping promote the arts and thereby enriching the lives of everyone in our community.

The awards were given by the Governor Wentworth Arts Council Visual Arts Scholarship Chair, Jeannette D'Onofrio and board member Barbara Gray. The awards are presented to students each year who are continuing their studies of the arts into college. Both students fulfilled the criteria of presenting a portfolio of artistic work which could include all forms of visual art as well as address their desire to pursue their art education beyond high school.







NOTE FROM EVENT CHAIR, Debbie Hopkins

Thirty-four years ago there was a wonderful resurgence of traditional crafts and craft fairs were held in parking lots, barns and meadows. Our committee's goal in creating this event has been to make it a pleasant day in our beautiful park and make it an easy show for artists to do. Bailey's has supplied us with blueberry muffins so the exhibitors have a breakfast while setting up, Lady of the Lakes Quilters serve lemonade at 3pm when energy lags, we provide a fleet of volunteers to spell the exhibitors when they need a break... our concern has always been for their comfort and success.

For the past five years we have watched the exhibitors struggle to make the show work for them financially. The craft business is suffering in these financially hard times. The exhibitors have let us know on their questionnaires that their returns have been poor.

Thirty-four years ago we juried upwards to a hundred applicants for "Artists in the Park" . Over the years we have watched the numbers go down, until the past five years it has been difficult to choose a balanced show of 41 fine artists, photographers, and original craftspersons. The past two years we have chosen fewer in order to maintain this standard.

It seems the time has arrived for us to close out "Artists in the Park" this year, in the thirtyfourth year. Our support for the arts, especially local arts, may well see an entirely new event take shape in the coming years.

The 34th annual "Artists in the Park", Wednesday, August 14th, will continue its tradition of high quality, original crafts, fine art and photography, and an occasional surprise. There will be familiar faces and some exciting new creative work.

A wider selection of clothing this year includes Marie Reimensnyder with printed, stenciled and painted images on dyed cotton clothing; Mary-Alice Dalton with fine apparel and accessories for infant to preteen girls; and Heather Kidson with handpainted silk clothing and scarves. Susan Arnold will be there with quirky and colorful floor clothes. Pottery is represented by Wolfeboro's Doug Blum and Gogi Millner (Cornish Hill Pottery); Bill Spaulding and Sholeh Regna who works in porcelain jewelry and ceramic sculpture. Richard and Roxanne O'Neal work with paper creating amazing origami, jewelry, Scherenschnitte and Quilling art. Kristine Andrews is a traditional New England style basket maker. Gary LaRose is an artistic blacksmith. (...second one to apply in 34 years!) Don McAulay Sr. and Jr. offer rustic furniture with birch detailing and Jeff Nelson from Hudson River Inlay Company brings Marquetry mirrors, screens, and small furniture pieces.

Jewelry is a big category and will offer shoppers a wide variety of original and exciting work. Thomas Kuhner works in precious metals and some stone settings; Judith Barker works in silver, gold, copper and bronze metals; Suzan Scribner Reed uses recycled paper; Nurit Niskala is a metal smith and does wire wrapping; Patiricia Flynn creates with birch bark, precious metals and pearls, and also brings mirrors. Victoria Tane collects "found items" and each piece is one-of-a-kind.

Photography is represented by Dana Clemons from White Mountain Photo Gallery; Ronald Wilson, Josh Axelrod, and Roger Irwin. These photographers represent a wide range of New England scenes in all seasons, to wild animals.

Fine arttist Jessie O'Brien works with woodburning/Pyrography. Tina S. Gagnon uses colored pencil and Roland Simard 's medium is hand cast pigmented paper pulp which gives texture to his paintings. Gene Matras' s pen and ink scenes of nature are well-known. Mike Driscoll, Denis Lablanc; and Jeanette Fournier will offer watercolors. Tim Reimensnyder paints portraits in oil and Ginny Nickerson uses oil to capture landscapes. Elizabeth Craumer offers pastels and Eileen Belanger works in acrylics. Nancy Stillwagon's "canvas" is fabric, stitchery and paint to create charming pictures.

The Mouse Ladies will again turn fingerprints into charming figures of action. Lynn Barube will demonstrate spinning with different weights of colorful yarns, creating art scarves/necklaces in the morning and Peter Ferber will demonstrate watercolor from 1-4 in the afternoon. Entertainer Robert Rivest will charm one and all with his zany tricks and mime.



Artists are invited to join in a day of plein air painting in Wolfeboro on Saturday, September 7. Participants in this 4th annual Paint the Town event, sponsored by the Governor Wentworth Arts Council, can set up downtown, along the lakeshore, or on one of Wolfeboro's nearby walking trails. Artists are encouraged to register as soon as possible. The names of those registered by July 15 will be included in all publicity issued by the arts council. Visitors can watch works of art being created and can purchase pieces either during the day or in a sale at Cate Park from 2 to 3pm.

Artist registration begins at 9:30am. at the Community Bandstand in Cate Park, with painting under way until 2pm. Participants then make their way to the bandstand for the painting sale.

Painters pay a \$15 registration fee and agree to give 40% of any sale to the Governor Wentworth Arts Council. Painters set the prices for their work. Those registered receive a Paint the Town T-shirt, coffee and pastries in the morning, and water throughout the day. In addition, runners will be available to provide work-site coverage for artist breaks. Unsold works remain the property of the artist.

The Governor Wentworth Arts Council uses the monies raised to support arts programming in local schools and libraries.

Poster Mania! Leisure, Romance and Adventure in 1890s America May 24, 2013 — Sept. 2, 2013

Edward Penfield created his first art poster 120 years ago to announce the April 1893 issue of Harper's monthly magazine. Magazine and book publishers rushed to follow Harper's lead producing a flood of bold and dazzling placards to announce their latest offerings. These artful, witty, often humorous graphic images inspired the poster mania that gripped the nation in the mid-1890s. The eager public clamored to collect, trade, display and critique the dramatic, ever changing designs. Artists became famous overnight for their personal styles, and they competed in poster competitions. One of America's most popular artists of the early twentieth century—Maxfield Parrish—first emerged as an award winning poster designer and is represented in the exhibition by several works, including two he did for the state of New Hampshire.

Posters captivated the booming urban middle class and their interest in leisure activities like reading, bicycling, golf and sailing. Competing publishers and their fashion conscious designers helped introduce the public to the avant-garde European art styles of the day. Posters by Edward Penfield and Will Carqueville reflected the influence of French post-impressionists in their use of areas of bold, contrasting color. The sinuous lines and elaborate patterns of designs by Will Bradley and Louis John Rhead were inspired by the trendy new styles of French art nouveau and English arts and crafts. Female artists like Ethel Read and Blanche McManus struck a chord with the rapidly growing population of women readers. Even paintings by artists like Frederick Remington and Everett Shinn were reproduced as posters.

This selection of more than 90 posters from the Currier's collection includes some of the most popular and sought after posters from the 1890s. Many are from the collection of Manchester resident Orien Dodge, who gave the Currier Museum 280 original posters in 1943.
